"Old" Does Not Necessarily Mean "Out of Date"

I live with an individual who refuses to throw anything away... no matter how old. Although it used to drive me crazy, I've come to realize some things just never become too old to be serviceable. One of those things Ray has kept over the years is a set of encyclopedias from 1958 and it seems someone in our household is always dragging one of the volumes out to look something up. It was during one of these information forays that I ran across the excerpt on Folk Music and was pleasantly surprised to find, even though the entry is 35 years old, it still applies. The article read, in part:

"Folk Music is music which has grown up among the people as an important part of their daily lives. It usually contains unusual rhythms and unusual scales..." Already sounds like the Folk Club, doesn't it? "The language and customs of each race are reflected in its music. The music of the Latin people reflects their love of romance, beauty, and sparking gayety. This is in direct contrast to the slower, more regular music of the Teutons. ." (the lower Germanic cultures)..." or the fiery, animated measures of the Slavs. English and American folk song is generally narrative and tells the story of a person or event. "

"The folk music of a locality remains mostly the same even though its boundaries or nationality may change. The songs of Alsace and Lorraine are equally French and German. Many tunes of Russia, Poland, Czechoslovakia, and Hungary have been claimed by Austria and Germany but the strong racial characteristics of these airs have kept them distinct from Austrian and German folk music. The Wendish colony of the Spreewald, near Berlin, has for generations been surrounded by Teutonic civilization but its folk music is as typically Slavic as any to be found in Russia."

"Their are three types of folk music; they are dance songs, legendary folk songs, and composed folk songs. The Dance songs are probably the oldest type of folk music. They were first sung as an accompaniment for dancing. The names of the composer have been lost to history. The rhythm of the dance song is always strongly accented and may be clapped by the hands. Some of the dances "The legendary folk song is frequently of early origin. It is poetic in character, and speaks directly from the singer's hears. 'Loch Lomond' (Scottish), 'Vermeland' (Swedish), 'All through the Night' (Welsh), and the American Negro spirituals are excellent examples"

"The composed folk song belongs to a later date. It reflects the daily life of the people. The composer is known. Among the most famous examples are 'Annie Laurie' (Scottish), 'Die Lorelei' (German), 'O Sole Mio' (Italian), and 'Swanee River' (American)."

"Patriotic songs may be either legendary or composed and are often inspired by some historical crisis. 'Men of Harlech' (Welsh), 'Scots Who Hale Wi' Wallace Bled' (Scottish), 'La Marseillaise', and 'The Battle Hymn of the Republic' (American) are famous among many patriotic songs that have been composed."

"American folk music is broad in scope and in its number of songs, although the country is still comparatively young. Part of the folk music is imported, as for example, the Mexican songs of the Southwest, the Creole songs of Louisiana, and the English ballads on the Atlantic seaboard. But the 'Boll Weevil Song', 'The Cowboy's Lament', 'Poor Wayfaring Stranger,' and 'I Wonder as I Wander' are thoroughly American."

The article went on to discuss relatively new folk musicians who were carrying on the folk tradition...singers and songwriters like Burl Ives, Woody Guthrie, Josh White, and Huddle Ledbetter. I haven't ventured over to the public library to see what the 1993 encyclopedia says about the subject of folk music, but I think we've probably seen some of this generation's "new folk musicians ...carrying on the tradition" at the Open Mike just about any Tuesday of the month. Who knows, maybe our grandchildren will see our names in an encyclopedia some day.


