# Your Folk Club - What Can You Do?

Every week we come to the Tortilla Factory and enjoy the open mike, or the special guest performers, or the party evenings with balloons and all that jazz. Most of you have given some thought to who makes all of this possible, but some might be a little surprised at all that goes on behind the scenes to bring you the Folk Club each week. In this issue, your editor will try to provide a snapshot of what it takes and who it takes to make the Folk Club a working organization which we can all enjoy.

Let's start with the Open Mike on Tuesdays which is what most people know as "The Folk Club." Just what goes on to pull this off each week?

First we have the restaurant staff at the Tortilla Factory who set up our room completely and specially for your dining and drinking pleasure each week.

Next we have our set-up volunteers (for what now seems like forever this has been Jim Rosenkrans, but for the next few months will need to be others as he takes a sabbatical to seek more knowledge). The set up consists of retrieving the sound equipment from its storage location in the back of the restaurant (way up high) and placing the speakers, monitor, sound board, mikes, cables, stool, music stand and sign-up board out in the appropriate locations and connecting it all up so that it works and the cables don't trip everyone in the room. And then there is the tall person who puts out the spotlights!

Then we have the person or persons who will run the sound for the evening. Lead on this are Ray Kaminsky and Larry Mediate with Richard Flinchbaugh and Ray Hillman filling in most frequently. This is a skilled position and it is what makes most of us sound good to the audience (without feedback, most of the time.)

Every night you will find a huge selection of information about the folk scene set up in the front of the room for your perusal and taking. Ellen Kaminsky has been schlepping and keeping this reference material current for quite a few years now. Every week we have an emcee for the evening's activities. Ellen, Dave Hurd and Bill Davis have been most frequently carrying out this activity, but there have been numerous others who have undertaken to "lead the group", as it were and all have done excellently in the work.

At the end of each evening comes the "clean-up crew" which takes apart all which Jim has assembled and returns it to its storage in the back room, repacks all the publicity materials for another week and helps to shoo out the hangers-on so we can make it out of the room by 10PM as we have promised management we will try to do each week.

Well, that makes up most of the weekly activities, but there are other activities which come with the special evenings. These include: selling tickets on the night of special guests; selling the tapes and CDs brought by the special guests; buying and bringing the cakes for the parties; and, sometimes, providing transport or lodging for special guests.

A few of the other activities are equally important to the Club and they include: publishing, printing and distributing the newsletter; printing tickets and flyers for the special guest nights (Dave Hurd); preparing and sending out newspaper publicity articles (Lynn Jordan); booking the remarkable talent (Ray Kaminsky); providing liaison and coordination with the local arts and town organizations (Ellen Kaminsky); and organizing and coordinating outside singing opportunities for the club (Lynn, Ray, Ellen, Bill Davis and others).

Some of these activities have been done by the same individuals for the last six to eight years and, to be honest folks, it is probably time for some of them to be handed over to "new blood." It isn't that anyone wants to quit, but doing the same job week in and week (or month) out can be a bit tedious and stressful.

As we say each week at the mike, "we are a volunteer organization - it doesn't get done without volunteers." The Folk Club has a board of directors (now nine persons but allowable up to fifteen), if you think you would like to take a turn at something and have a talent for anything mentioned in this article - see someone and ask if you can help, or take over some of these tasks - I'm sure some of the "old timers" will welcome the respite and go on to do something even better for the club.
