




Catfish Hodge

Catfish Hodge is an icon in the Washington, DC, metro area. For those of us who shuffled down to Georgetown to see him over 30 years ago, we have been and remain fans. Since the late sixties, Hodge has recorded 23 albums of original material and has extensively toured with a wide variety of musicians, from members of Little Feat to Vassar Clements. It's one thing for a bluesman to make you share his pain. It's quite another for him to make you share his appetite. By the time Catfish is finished with singing the praises of the "Queen of the Greens" from his "Bare Necessities" album, you may find yourself lusting for suppertime down South. When he breaks full throttle into "Drive My Car", he will pull you singing and clapping along and smiling with joy. When he goes down quiet in "My Father", it's as though you've gone to church on a bright Sunday morning and been moved by the preacher on the pulpit. He delivers his amusing lyrics with gusto, charges blues with emotion and ballads with sweet tenderness. Bonnie Raitt called him "one of the most powerful singers alive today"!

For Catfish Hodge it seems the road has gone on forever; he's been up, he's been down, he's recorded for all kinds of labels, made all kinds of deals, but like a Timex watch he's kept the faith throughout it all. His influences include a rainbow of artists such as Professor Longhair, Steve Goodman, Willie Dixon, Al Kooper, Little Feat and Chicken Legs. He plays roots oriented acoustic selections, like "Twenty Years" or "New Dust Bowl Blues," which pay homage to versions recorded by Alan Lomax for the Library of Congress collections from the thirties. Sometimes he is backed by a power horn section and kicking drummer that follow the Chicago styles of Muddy Waters and Elmore James. In each case, Catfish is equally tasteful and comfortable in the presentation. Catfish has a message for children as well. With his "Endangered Species Orchestra," he serves up lessons in nature preservation and friendship. "Adventures at Catfish Pond" is a wistful collection of feel-good, toe-tapping R&B, bluegrass and jazz tunes. The songs accompany a tall tale of a pancake feast for critter friends in the Southern backwoods--alligators, raccoons, birds and toads. Some of you may recall the fun of "Catfish in the Frying Pan" at the third Herndon Blues Fest. Thanks to Harny and Fang for bringing this legend to the Folk Club.

On most Tuesday evenings, the Folk Club is an open mike format with a sign-up board. Each performer has 12 minutes, including setup time. This allows three songs if you set up FAST and the songs are of moderate length.

Showcase Performances

On the second Tuesday of each month, we feature a Folk Club member in a tow set (25-minute) "Showcase" performance. To be in a showcase you must:

- be a Folk Club member who has not done a showcase in 6 months
- fill out a lottery slip any time in the month before the drawing
- win the drawing on the night of the current month's showcase
- prepare to be featured in the next newsletter!

Folk Club members are encouraged to submit performance calendars, classified advertisements, articles, reviews, artwork and other music related items to Irene Boyer at irene@caboyer.com. All items must be emailed in MSWord, WordPerfect, or ASCII text format. Information must be received one week before the first day of the month in which you want it published. Items will be printed on the basis of music related interest, timeliness and space available with club information being the first priority.
