We Shall Overcome: Songs of Protest and Peace

The great civil rights leader James Farmer wrote this account of the Freedom Riders in his autobiography *Lay Bare the Heart*:

“The jailer rushed to our cell block, eyes red from lack of sleep. Trembling...he shouted, ‘Y’all have to stop that singing.’

“Leroi Wright ...swung his fist toward the ceiling and yelled, ‘Come on, let’s sing some more. Let’s let ‘em know we’re here and let ‘em know who we are.’

“They needed no urging:

If you can’t find me in the backa the bus;
You can’t find me nowhere,
Oh-h, come on up to the fronta the bus,
I’ll be ridin’ up there.

“We sang it over. And over. Women’s voices wafted through the doors and crevices of another wing.... From another floor, white Freedom Riders answered, changing a few words:

If you can’t find us in the fronta the bus;
You can’t find me nowhere,
Oh-h, come on back to the *backa* the bus;
I’ll be ridin’ back there.


“The jailhouse rocked with songs of the Freedom Riders. Predawn Jackson [Mississippi] had never heard the likes of it before.” (10)

From jailed Freedom Riders in Mississippi to peace activists in Northern Ireland, from Victor Jara of Chilean New Songs Movement to Joe Hill of Utah Mining Camps, songs have served to protest injustice and inspire, unite, and comfort those involved in the struggle around the world for peace and human rights. Todd Crowley’s showcase will celebrate the great Songs of Protest and Peace.

Singing in his lush baritone and accompanying himself on several autoharps (he has a different one for each key), Todd will feature songs he’ll be teaching at Common Ground on the Hill during Traditions Week II. Common Ground, held every summer at McDaniel College in Westminster MD, is Walt Michael’s visionary music & arts camp designed to bring together diverse peoples and cultures. Todd encourages everyone in the Folk Club to visit www.commongroundonthehill.com and consider spending a week in July studying everything from African drumming to Irish penny whistle.

Todd also took his *We Shall Overcome* workshop to the California Autoharp Gathering in May, where he opened the Gathering for such folk icons as Peggy Seeger and Bryan Bowers. After retiring as an English teacher and basketball coach in the Fairfax County Public Schools, Todd is shaping a new career in song, featuring research skills that match his performances. Lesser-Known Music Legends: "Pop" Stoneman



Born on May 25, 1893 in Carroll County, Virginia (close to what would later become Galax) Ernest Van "Pop" Stoneman was brought up in a family steeped in the music of the Blue Ridge Mountains. His mother had died when he was three, and he was raised by his father and several musically-inclined cousins who introduced him to the instrumental and vocal traditions of the Appalachians. His musical career started in 1914 while he was working at a cotton mill in Fries, Virginia. Using an autoharp he had crafted with parts from an old piano, he recorded a tune on a "home recording machine" owned by a co-worker.

In 1918 Ernest married Hattie Frost, another local musician. They would later start a family whose musical influence would be felt for decades, but for now he kept music as a hobby, playing mostly for friends and his own enjoyment.

In 1924, Ernest heard a record made by Henry Whitter. He felt confident that he could make a better recording, and determined to change his career and his life. Traveling to New York, he cut two songs for the Okeh label, including what would become the first million-selling record for country music, "*The Sinking of the Titanic*". He was directed during several sessions on the Okeh and Victor labels by Ralph Peer. In 1927, he helped Ralph conduct the legendary Bristol Sessions, and was the first of five acts to records for those sessions, including the Carter Family and Jimmie Rodgers. By now, Ernest had added other family members to his recordings for a full string band sound. Between 1924 and 1929, he recorded some 200 songs, but by 1932 the Great Depression finally forced him to move his family (now with nine children) to the Washington D.C. area.

The whole family struggled through dire poverty until 1941, when Ernest obtained a more regular job at the Naval Gun Factory. In 1947, the Stoneman Family won a talent contest at Constitution Hall that gave them six months' exposure on local television. In 1956, "Pop" won \$10,000 on the NBC-TV quiz show *The Big Surprise* and sang on the show as well. That same year, the **Blue Grass Champs**, a group composed largely of his children, were winners on the CBS-TV program *Arthur Godfrey's Talent Scouts*, and Mike Seeger recorded "Pop" and Hattie for Folkways.

Ernest decided to retire from his job and the Champs went full-time to become the Stonemans. They did albums for Starday in 1962 and 1963, and in 1964 they went to Texas and California, cutting an album for World Pacific, playing at Disneyland, on some network shows and at several Folk festivals. In 1965, they went to Nashville, where they got a contract with MGM Records and started a syndicated TV show. In 1967 they received CMA's "Vocal Group of the Year".

"Pop" passed away on June 14, 1968 at the height of his popularity, but his children continued to record through the 70's. Daughter Roni, often referred to as *The First Lady of the Banjo*, also became a regular on the smash hit TV show *Hee-Haw* as Ida Lee Nagger, the "Ironing Board Lady".

MUSICAL NOTES



It Was a Graveyard Smash...



Bobby "Boris" Pickett, who co-wrote the #1 hit *The Monster Mash*, passed away on April 25th after suffering from Leukemia. His famous tune, recorded with a group referred to as *The Crypt-Kickers*, held the top spot in the Top 40 for two weeks prior to Halloween in 1962. The song made two comebacks in the US charts, in 1970 and 1973 (where it reached #10), and in October of 1973 it reached #3 in the UK charts.

His daughter Nancy was at his side when he died. He leaves behind two grandchildren, Jordan and Olivia. The Sunday, May 13 2007 episode of the Dr. Demento show featured a documentary retrospective of Pickett's work.

Still Famous After All These Years

On May 23 **Paul Simon** became the first-ever recipient of the Library of Congress **Gershwin Prize for Popular Song**. The newly created award recognizes the profound and positive effect of popular music on the world's culture. In the 1960's Paul Simon and Art Garfunkel become immensely popular by bringing an urbane, literate sensibility to their unique blend of Pop and Folk music. It seems fitting that this new award is named after George and Ira Gershwin, who brought a sense of panache and classical sophistication to the popular music of the day, in essence "making a lady out of Jazz".

A concert to celebrate the award took place the same night at the Warner Theater, and it will be broadcast on June 27th at 9pm EDT on local PBS stations. Performers included friends and prior collaborators, including: Jerry Douglas, Art Garfunkel, Philip Glass, Alison Krauss, Ladysmith Black Mambazo, Lyle Lovett, Stephen Marley, James Taylor, Buckwheat Zydeco, and others.
